

## **MARQUETRY TOOL LIST**

### **With Marc Adams**

### **August 3-7, 2020**

The following is a list of the hand tools that you should bring to the Marquetry class. The class will have a \$60 material fee to cover the veneer used in the class and other consumable supplies. There will be veneer available for purchase at the end of the class. Veneer tape will be available to purchase at the school. The school has plenty of DeWalt scroll saws, and will provide all the blades.

1. 3/4" masking tape - 1 or 2 rolls, the blue tape is nice. (The less "tack" the better.)
2. Tracing paper, make sure it is very transparent (Canson brand available at Hobby Lobby or other art stores).
3. Carbon paper or graphite paper (today they are referred to as transfer paper). Make sure you get the kind that is smudge resistant. It is also nice to have other colors of transfer paper such as white, black, gray or yellow. This material is very important to have and is becoming very hard to find. You will have better luck trying art stores or hobby stores.
4. Several #2 pencils and erasers. You will also need at least one white pencil to mark on dark woods.
5. X-ACTO knife with many extra #11 blades.
6. Small kitchen sponge, and a large plastic butter tub lid.
7. Plastic or Metal Straight edge, 3/4" to 1" in width (no wider than 1 1/4" and no longer than 24").
8. Drafting triangle with 30-60-90 degree angles and 45-45-90.
9. 3/4" veneer tape with no holes. Available for purchase at the school.
10. Patterns and ideas to make into wood such as flowers, geometric shapes, etc.
11. If you want to bring your own scroll saw please do, but we have plenty here. If you need a scroll saw magnifying glass to help you see small work, please feel free to bring your own. It would be nice to have a bench light as well.
12. A gallon zip lock bag to store your wet sponge in over night.
13. Self healing cutting mat, available at hobby stores. 24" x 36" is recommended.
14. A cloth baby diaper safety pin or a "t" top straight sewing pin.
15. Bring plenty of patience; marquetry is simple but slow and sometimes tedious.
